This message about abundant human potential has enabled us to think thoughts and do deeds that other communities would have stifled or denied. We've been talking a lot about "shared ministry" at UU Church of St. Petersburg. What does that mean? For me, it means that UUSP is a place where I give my time, talents and treasure in order to build a spiritual community that makes a difference in my life, in other individual congregants' lives, and in our broader community.

I spend from 15 to 20 hours during most weeks on church functions, including preparing for and attending Board and Ministry meetings, writing and responding to emails and other correspondence, and taking part in activities, such as ringing handbells, participating in a Covenant group, and occasionally preparing and serving food at the Friday picnic. To these activities, I bring my talents, including an ability to organize, to listen and synthesize a wide range of viewpoints, to communicate effectively through writing, and to cook. I also offer my treasure, through an annual pledge and other financial contributions.

I have found that the more I give, the more I receive in return....close friendships that spring from an understanding of others after working through difficult issues; personal satisfaction in seeing church accomplishments I have had a hand in bringing about; the reality of the inherent worth and dignity of every individual that is so apparent while sharing food at the Picnic. These are gifts that have helped me grow spiritually, that make me feel more connected to the universal power of love and of life.

What excites you about UU St. Pete? What gifts do you have that can help spread that excitement? If you can smile and say hello and have about 30 minutes a week to spare, you can help greet guests on Sunday morning, potentially opening the door to a new community for those who are searching for what our church offers. If you have a little over an hour each week and love the energy of our young people, consider spending an occasional Sunday in the Religious Education classes, passing on your life experiences to the next generation. I have lots of other suggestions – just ask me or any other Board member and we'll talk about ways your gifts can enrich our community and your own spiritual journey.

There are some very practical gifts we cannot do without. It takes money to run any organization. This month, the Board will begin developing a proposed budget for the church fiscal year that begins July 1.

The Board has planned special meetings in the coming weeks to talk about the budget. The first meeting, on Tuesday, Feb. 2, will begin at 7 pm. We'll spend about one hour talking about Ministers' priorities, then switch to preliminary budgeting at about 8 pm. We'll follow that with another special Board meeting on Tuesday, March 2 at 7 pm; this meeting primarily will be focused on the budget. All congregants are welcome to attend these special Board meetings as well as any of the regularly scheduled Board meetings on the second Wednesday of each month. Our next regular Board meeting will be Wednesday, Feb. 10 at 7 pm.

In recent years, about half of our budget has come from the financial pledges congregants make during our annual Stewardship campaign. The budget for the upcoming year likely will rely more heavily on pledges, as the financial contributions we have received for the past five years from a generous Anonymous Donor are now ending. The Anonymous Donor believed we were a community worth preserving. I hope each of us honors that trust by making a serious financial commitment for the upcoming year.

## UUA Trustee Tidbits

There is always information to be written about governing as a board using the Carver Policy Governance method. Although both the Florida District Board and the UUA Board of Trustees (BOT) studied and were trained in Carver PG, the UUA BOT has adapted much of what is appropriate in policy governance as we govern on your behalf. The BOT has begun to tackle more deeply the issues on whose behalf we govern and to whom we are accountable.

For the readers of this column it may be good to understand certain aspects of policy governance which are affecting the deliberations, decisions, and operation of the BOT. It is necessary to clarify who the “owners”, also known as one of our Sources, are in our governance structure. Owners are all those UUs who are the people on whose behalf the BOT determines the Ends: the benefits being produced, for whom at what cost. Owners in our Association are the congregations. An owner is sometimes perceived as a “customer” when requesting services from the District and/or UUA Staff. The use of the term “stakeholders”, who are not “owners”, refers to those who have an interest in our Association and includes employees and other UU organizations. The time frame and expected results for owners are long-term, involves the big picture and future returns. For customers expectations are much more short term. The connections our UUA has with our owners and customers are very different.

The BOT will govern with an emphasis on outward vision, an encouragement of diversity in viewpoints, strategic leadership, a clear distinction between the roles of the BOT and President, collective decisions, the future, pro-activity, and an open, transparent process. Our primary focus will be linkage with our congregations in a process of engaging the relational, cooperative power of covenant. The work of the BOT in connecting with congregations will not be “telling” or “reporting” but rather “listening” to perspectives regarding needs and what benefits our UUA should produce, be accountable, and let you know what is being achieved.

The BOT will be concerned with congregational values and who in the congregation speaks for these values. This will help determine the values of future generations of UUs. The BOT may involve itself in the history and theology of UUism to be sure the values inherent in our UU traditions and heritage are understood. We will be involved with much questioning and researching.

Hopefully in March I will be able to write about the method of selection that will identify a random sample from a variety of representative groups, perhaps determined by congregation size and location. Our linkage focus will be “right relationship” between the BOT and its member congregations in their role as Sources. ## CBS Opinion

Five years ago, CBS rejected an ad from the United Churches of Christ, deeming that their message - that the church would accept all people - was too controversial. Now, they will be airing an ad during the Super Bowl from Focus on the Family - a group that firmly stands against a woman's right to choose - featuring Tim Tebow, the University of Florida football star and carrying a distinctly anti-abortion message. Integrity demands that CBS publicly offer the United Church of Christ the opportunity they were wrongly denied in December 2004, and give them the chance to buy an ad slot during the Super Bowl to advertise their acceptance of all people, or reject Focus on the Family's ad.

### National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month

President Obama's proclamation states, in part: "The United States was founded on the principle that all people are born with an unalienable right to freedom -- an ideal that has driven the engine of American progress throughout our history. As a Nation, we have known moments of great darkness and greater light. Yet even today, the darkness and inhumanity of enslavement exists. Millions of people worldwide are held in compelled service, as well as thousands within the United States.

... Fighting modern slavery and human trafficking is a shared responsibility. This month, I urge all Americans to educate themselves about all forms of modern slavery... Together, we can and must end this most serious, ongoing criminal civil rights violation."

And a way to educate yourself about that fight -- please take a few minutes to view the Fair Food Project at [www.fairfoodproject.org](http://www.fairfoodproject.org) -- a sobering yet uplifting multimedia presentation promoting a more socially just food system in the U.S. It was created by California Institute for Rural Studies and Rick Nahmias Photography.

Through the stories and voices of farmworkers, growers, businesses and fair food advocates, learn about the harsh realities of farmworker conditions and, more importantly, the promise of improved farm labor practices in American agriculture. The growing movement for "fair food" is tapping into rising consumer demand for food produced in accordance with their values.

### Coalition of Immokalee Workers (CIW) - PUBLIX Campaign

The CIW continues its campaign asking PUBLIX to purchase winter tomatoes from growers who pay a fair wage and adhere to safety conditions in the fields. On January 21<sup>st</sup> members of UU St Pete demonstrated with the CIW and other congregations at the grand opening of new Publix in Pinellas Park.
